Poster Session: Visual Sociology: Social Problems Photo Essay Contest

<u>Description</u>: A photographic essay is a personal and integrative statement about a social problem of importance to the student (undergraduate/graduate). The essay is limited to five to eight photographs which should reflect the social problem under consideration, elicit an emotive response from the viewer, and be a statement of public affirmation of your position on the issue.

<u>Instructions</u>: Title your essay, but no written copy is to accompany the photographs other than the location where the picture was taken in fine print. Place the photos in such the order of presentation that they "read" like an essay. Photographs downloaded from the Internet are acceptable as long as copyright laws are not violated. Please avoid large poster board presentations.

Due Date for Project Proposal:

Friday October 22nd (by email to session organizer)

<u>Juried Competition</u>: The judges will evaluate the appropriateness of the title, whether photographs reflect the social problem under consideration, demonstrate a given position on the issue, elicit an emotive response from the viewer, "read" like an essay, general presentation / mounting, proper citation of location where pictures were taken or complete website URL, and all instructions were followed. Judges will also consider student's verbal responses at the site of the judging.

<u>Awards</u>: There will be **two competitions** – one "*Juried*" (refereed) by invited faculty members, and a second "*People's Choice*" award voted on by all those who view the posters during the session. Judging will be conducted separately for graduate and undergraduate students and three winners will be identified in each award category. Winners will be announced at the annual business meeting of the SSA where they will receive a "Certificate of Excellence" and first place winners will receive a monetary prize.
